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Message from the Commander "American Legion Post 208: A Pillar of Service"

Founded on the principles of service, camaraderie, and patriotism, American Legion Post 208 has long been a fixture in the Kerrville community. Its membership comprises veterans, their families, and supporters who are committed to serving both fellow veterans and the broader public. When the flooding began, these values were more than words—they became a rallying cry for action. When heavy rains pounded Kerr County and caused flooding along the Guadalupe River, American Legion Post 208 responded by serving as a logistics center for first responders.

Post 208, situated next to the FEMA command post on the river, serves as a logistics hub for first responders. Robert Garcia, the post commander, and his team have kept their post open 24/7 providing a place for first responders to get meals. They also sorted key donations such as bug spray, clean and dry socks, and other hygiene items.

The Legion's parking lot became a bustling center of activity, with volunteers sorting donations, assembling care packages, and distributing goods to families in need. The organization also helped manage monetary donations, ensuring funds were directed to the most urgent relief efforts and to families facing immediate hardship.

The Post's hall also served as a meeting venue for agency briefings, public updates, and volunteer training sessions. By providing space and logistical support, the Legion ensured that relief operations could proceed smoothly and efficiently.

The post closed its hall to allow first responders to sleep overnight. Volunteers transported them to nearby gyms to get showers. They also fed them breakfast and dinner.

During the day, other post volunteers transported donated lunches to those on-scene.

Garcia also added that when he came to the July Texas Department annual meeting, he was greeted with donations from other posts throughout Texas. Later, checks from other state American Legion posts arrived.

At the close of the annual department convention, he had over \$20,000 in cash and gift cards. The response to Post 208's logistical work typifies a key aspect of the American Legion constitution preamble with this phrase: "To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation."

As you recite this line from the preamble before your next post meeting, I hope you will remember how Legionnaires throughout Texas and in parts of the nation practice this key principle. When bad things happen in our community, our organization always steps up to help those in need.

The latest official reports from Kerr County's leadership are that cleanup could take six months to search for missing people. So, the work will continue.

American Legon members and other veterans can send checks or gift cards to the post. Garcia asks if you send those donations with a check, you designate flood relief on any check sent to Post 208 at the following address:

Thank you Legionnaires for electing me to be your Department Historian for 2025–2026. I will continue to be available for any questions, training or assistance with the History Book compilation for your Post.

Here is a synopsis of the History Book competition that took place in Austin at the Department Convention. There were 135 Posts represented at the Convention and there were 8 books turned in this year (1 more than 2024), from 8 different districts. The books were from Post 490 - 2nd District, Post 597 - 5th District, Post 159 - 6th District, Post 133 - 11th District, Post 655 - 12th District, Post 240 - 17th District, and Post 828 - 20th District. Four judges (1 from each of the Divisions) reviewed all the books and made their decision. The results were as follows: 1st Place Post 133, 2nd Place Post 828, 3rd Place 490 and 4th Place Post 597. Thank you again for all the Posts that submitted a book for the competition and I hope to see more next year.

In recognition and sincere appreciation of outstanding promotion through submission of articles to the Texas Legion Times, from 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025, in showcasing the American Legion and their programs and activities dedicated to God and country, I presented certificates to the following: Post 828 - San Antonio submitted 48 articles, Post 174 - Georgetown submitted 31 articles and Post 164 - Katy submitted 14 articles. Out of 466 Posts in the state of Texas only 22 posts submitted articles this past year. We need to change this by sharing your events to let everyone know what we are doing!

- The ideal word count for our format is 200 500 words (maximum), preferably with no double spacing.
- Give your article a TITLE! Create a HEADLINE and save with a proper file name so we can easily recognize it.
- Tell us who the author is, whether it's you or if you are just forwarding it to us.
- Attach any photos or artwork for your article separately in your email. DO NOT embed them in your Word or PDF file. Larger photos are best, and high resolution JPG files of 300 dpi or better are preferred. Please name these files accordingly so we can track them along with your article.

- Let us know in your e-mail of any corresponding photo captions, name of the photographer, etc. Please note that due to spacing and layout requirements, we may not be able to use every photo or caption submitted (preferably 2 3 photos per article).
- Please spell check everything! Especially people's names, web addresses, etc. We do our best to catch typos, and make corrections, but sometimes they still slip by. You can help us greatly by simply running the spell check function in your word processing software.
- We publish on our Website on the FIRST FRIDAY of the Month, with few exceptions. E-mail everything directly to times@txlegion.org by the 20th of every month, for it to appear in the *following* issue. This way we have plenty of time to work with in case we need to clarify anything with you.






Troop 1096 handed out water to the crowds at the Round Rock 4th of July parade. Despite the rain the Scouts had fun and did a fantastic job!



AUSTIN, Texas – (July 16, 2025) – In the aftermath of the recent catastrophic flooding that swept through Kerrville, Texas, and neighboring communities, Legionnaires rallied together at the 106th Annual Convention of The American Legion Department of Texas to provide emergency disaster relief funding, July 11–13.

During the convention, held at the Renaissance Austin Hotel, Legionnaires and numerous American Legion posts donated \$17,705 to assist Kerrville Memorial American Legion Post 208, which has been providing urgent relief and support for those affected.

"One of the most effective ways to help at this time is by contributing for disaster relief," said newly-elected Department Commander Rich Huntley of League City, Texas. "Providing financial contributions allow Legionnaires and posts throughout the Department of Texas to quickly address changing needs and assist in purchasing supplies in bulk."

Fifteen counties have been identified as eligible for The American Legion's National Emergency Fund grants which are available for Legionnaires and Legion posts impacted by recent flooding in central Texas.

Bulter-Redd Post 493 Collaboration with Taylor Sudden Services to Support Texas Hill Country

In a true demonstration of community spirit and service, members of the American Legion Bulter-Redd Post 493 of Nederland, Texas, joined forces with Taylor Sudden Services of Beaumont, Texas, to provide critical support to residents of the Texas Hill Country following recent catastrophic flooding. This natural disaster left many families displaced and in desperate need of basic necessities as they began the daunting task of recovery.

Understanding the urgency of the situation, volunteers from both organizations worked tirelessly to collect, organize, and package a wide array of much-needed supplies. Among the items donated were essential cleaning supplies,

batteries, children's snacks, bottled water, and pet food. These were carefully selected to address both immediate needs and long-term cleanup efforts. Buckets were filled with disinfectants, gloves, sponges, and other sanitizing tools thanks in large part to a generous contribution from Lowe's Home Improvement. In addition, large totes were packed with supplies by dedicated veterans and volunteers from the local community.

On Friday, July 18, 2025, a team of volunteers personally delivered the supplies to Comfort, Texas—a community significantly impacted by the flooding. From there, local organizations and relief teams began distributing the donations to surrounding towns and rural areas hit hardest by the disaster.

This collaboration between American Legion Bulter-Redd Post 493 and Taylor Sudden Services represents more than just a relief mission—it is a testament to the power of local partnerships, civic responsibility, and the unwavering commitment of veterans and citizens to support their fellow Texans during times of crisis.



Texas American Legion Continues Relief Efforts in Support of Kerrville Flood Victims

KERRVILLE, Texas – (July 23, 2025) – Legionnaires from across the state of Texas are continuing to provide support to relief victims of the disastrous floods which affected Kerr County.

Delivering a trailer of supplies to Kerrville Memorial Post 208 on July 16 were 12th District Commander Chad Page and 12th District Judge Advocate Amy King, both Citizen Emergency Response Team (CERT) certified personnel.

After unloading supplies, they were assigned to a search and rescue (SAR) team operated by American Core, in partnership with Post 208.

Over the next several days, SAR teams, consisting of Legion volunteers, conducted detailed searches in assigned sectors of the Guadalupe River.

While Page and King were searching, 12th District Historian Robin York was volunteering at the community food and first responder supply distribution point at Post 208.

On July 19, an additional trailer of supplies was delivered to Post 208 from Post 655 in Haltom City, Texas, and Mansfield Post 624 in Mansfield, Texas. These supplies were quickly distributed to the areas needed and to exhausted first responders.

"Post 208 has been a vital resource for the disaster response to the catastrophic flooding on the 4th of July," said Page. "Their strategic location on the Guadalupe River, to include being located next door to the Kerr County fairgrounds and the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) for the response, has allowed them to play a vital and key role in their community's recovery."

According to Page, within hours of the flooding, supplies started to roll into the Post 208 from all over the state, and the post's bingo hall became a general store that allowed residents to get a two week supply of food and essentials. Additionally, a special area of the general store was designated only for emergency responders.

The general store is open daily at 7 a.m. and manned by members of the Post 208 Legion family along with Legion family members from throughout the Department of Texas and beyond.

Each morning, a steady flow of first responders are receiving essentials for their day to include food before they head out to perform SAR operations. Along with providing personnel at the EOC, Post 208 has partnered with American Core, LLC., which provides management, equipment, and materials to organize volunteers for SAR/Recovery Operations and Recovery Operations for residents' homes.

The partnership between Post 208 and American Core is helping multiple communities recover, providing closure for the families that have been affected.

The collaboration launched several impactful initiatives, including a Veteran Women's Resource Fair, that drew over 124 participants. Women veterans in attendance gained access to critical services, heard from expert speakers addressing Military Sexual Trauma (MST), Mental Health First Aid, and Grace Trials, and connected with over 24 veteran-focused vendors. Each guest received a swag bag filled with helpful information, wellness gifts, and tokens of appreciation. Lunch was provided, giving attendees time to connect, recharge, and build community.

At the heart of the year's efforts was a faith-based mental health wellness program designed specifically for women who have served. The program directly reached over 800 women veterans, filling vital gaps in care by focusing on PTSD, anxiety, depression, spiritual crisis, and MST—challenges often under-addressed in traditional support systems.

Over 650 wellness packages were thoughtfully assembled and distributed. Each package included educational materials on VA services, suicide prevention, mental health and trauma recovery, along with faith-based resources, grounding tools, inspirational literature, an MST recovery book, and healing arts and crafts kits donated by Help Heal Veterans.

Support for the initiative came from a wide network of dedicated partners, including The American Legion Joe Knot Post 317 in Jarrell, The American Legion Post 133 Temple, GI Joan Project, Help Heal Veterans, The American Legion Auxiliary Unit 317 and local businesses such as Just Crafty LLC, DM Wellness and Wells2000 LLC.

Beyond the wellness kits, the program hosted three sixhour MST healing workshops in Belton, Waco, and Jarrell. These transformative events were led by Dr. Miette Wells, an award-winning author, combat-disabled veteran, MST survivor, and nationally recognized expert. The workshops provided trauma-informed education, local resources,





and spiritual tools for recovery. Each participant left with a wellness tote—and many with a renewed sense of strength.

One Marine Corps veteran, after a session, tearfully hugged Dr. Wells and said, "I felt alone and at the end of a rope—this saved me."

Of the wellness packages delivered, 550 were distributed in Texas, with another 100 mailed nationwide. Combined with workshop attendance, email outreach, and social media support, the program served over 800 women veterans throughout the year.

Encouraged by the program's success, GI Joan Project has announced ambitious plans this next Legion year: 1,000 wellness packages, a Veteran Woman Resource Fair and four MST healing workshops, are already in the works.
