

To be sent to Department by June 1st

National Security Awards (which are the easiest to apply for)

To be sent to your District Spring Convention then to Department by June 1st

All other awards for Post and District level go to www.txlegion.org and search Department Awards and see the list there.

All information can be found on the website or feel free to contact the chairperson of the committees that each fall under. We have to promote ourselves and the best way is to acknowledge others and promote our four pillars. Once a post starts working programs and sending out awards they need to contact the local press and let them know what they are doing. We do not pat ourselves on the back enough and we should be proud of what we do in the community.

- Attach any photos and/or artwork for articles separately (NOT embedded in your text file) as high resolution JPGs, 300 dpi, or better. Please name these files accordingly so we can track them along with your article.

Let us know in your e-mail of any corresponding captions, name of the photographer, etc.

- Please spell check everything! Especially people's names, web addresses, etc. We do our best to catch typos, but sometimes they still slip by. You can help us greatly here by simply running your spell check function in your word processing software.

 by the 20th of every month, for it to appear in the following issue. This way we have plenty of time to work with in case we need to clarify anything with you.

Veterans Service Organizations In Georgetown Collect and Deliver Largest Contribution of Clothing for Communities of Williamson and Bell Counties submitted by Frank Espinosa, Jr.

Veterans of American Legion Post 174; Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 8587; and, Central Texas Base U.S. Submarine Veterans, Inc. (USSVI), delivered 75 boxes of new and used clothing on October 12th and October 26th with an estimated weight of 1,875 pounds.

This was the first year of participation for the USSVI.

The donations were spread across three non-profit organizations, each receiving 25 boxes of the clothing. The non-profits included: The Caring Place, Georgetown; Families in Crisis, Inc., Killeen; and, the Salvation Army, Temple.

Delivery of the donations to the three non-profit organizations was a first-time event for the three local Veterans Service Organizations. Similar but smaller donations in the past 12 years were always delivered to a department of the Veterans Administration (VA) in Temple. The department assumed

responsibility for further distribution of donations to homeless and at-risk Veterans of Central Texas. However, due to a recent change in policy by the VA, used clothing is no longer accepted, only new clothing is accepted.

Frank Espinosa, Jr., the Event Coordinator for the three local Veterans Service Organizations stated the success of this year's collection was greatly attributable to local businesses in Georgetown who allowed collection containers in their building. The businesses were: David's Barber Shop at 3010 Williams Drive, Suite #228; and, Mel's Lone Star Lanes at 1010 N. Austin Avenue.

Espinosa stated American Legion Post 174 intends to continue to lead this program next year collecting only new clothing.

Awarded to Legionnaires for recruiting "NEW" members into The American Legion. This award is based upon the total accumulative number of New Members the Recruiter has signed up into The American Legion from the inception of this award through their Legion career. The pin will be awarded starting with the #1 for the first new member and then increase in increments of 5 (5, 10, 15, 20, etc.) based upon the accumulative total of new members recruited. Once the recruiter is awarded a pin level, he/she will work for the next higher pin level and once a pin level has been achieved a duplicate pin level will not be awarded.
